Chris Roberts, Arizona volunteer

"I was helping at an event with Colten Cowell Foundation and heard HopeKids needed volunteers at Whispering Hope Ranch. That event was one of the most spiritually enlightening experiences I've ever had. I never thought a volunteer experience would turn into my second family. I'm always available as the 'back-up guy,' if needed. But my favorites are the one-on-one events. I got to see a kid I knew at a building event. He was having a fit and was moaning loud. He grabbed my hand and calmed right down. That's the best compliment you can get. Period."

"I attended a HopeKids Arizona event in 2010, and I felt very passionate to get involved. I got involved [again] last year with the new Colorado chapter. My favorite activities are when I can bring my children with me. I like for them to see that we can't help with a diagnosis, but we can still help [in other ways]. Most everyone can relate to having someone close to them being diagnosed with a life-threatening illness. I competed for Mrs. Colorado America last week, and it gave me a chance to share my platform for providing advocacy, compassion and hope for the terminally ill—which ties into my father's terminal illness and the work I do for HopeKids."



Jeff Sibell, Minnesota HopeKid and volunteer

"I [became a HopeKid] when I was a year into cancer treatment for Acute Lymphoblastic Leukemia at age 12. [Several years later] my wife suggested we start volunteering. Even though she didn't know me when I had cancer, she felt strongly [to get involved] because she's seen the impact. Our favorite volunteer activities are the movies. The kids are always so excited. I remember always looking forward to the HopeKids movies myself with my family and siblings. It's joy and excitement, and it's not a hospital visit. I felt the HopeKids impact firsthand as a kid. Now being a volunteer, I experience the punch line of: 'Restoring Hope.' You can see right away that it's making an impact for a kid."
